City Manager's Message

Dooking ahead, 2016 is slated to be another productive year for Lake Forest as we focus on a number of initiatives that will build a better, stronger community for generations to come. I am pleased to announce that the City Council recently approved two major contracts which will kick off the Civic Center Project –known as Lake Forest's 100-Year Home. To ensure the community's values are reflected in the Lake Forest Civic Center, there will be plenty of opportunities for community engagement



during the design phase. Traffic signal synchronization remains a top priority. The City has completed six corridors (El Toro Road, Jeronimo Road, Los Alisos Boulevard, Lake Forest Drive, Santa Margarita Road, and Trabuco Road) and by the end of 2016 will wrap up two more synchronization projects (Alton Parkway and Barranca Parkway/ Muirlands Boulevard) bringing the number of fully synchronized corridors in the City up to eight.

From roads to parks, we're also moving forward on a number of park projects including the renovation of Village Pond Park, as well as the design of a new Portola Park to include a second dog park. Finally, keeping local tax dollars in Lake Forest plays a large role in funding these types of community projects. To make shopping and dining in Lake Forest even easier, we'll be introducing a Shop and Dine Lake Forest app later this year. By downloading this application, users will be able to search for local businesses and great deals from the ease of their mobile devices.

We'll also be celebrating the 25th anniversary of cityhood. The 25th Anniversary Committee members are working hard to plan a fun-filled year to mark the occasion. Upcoming annual events such as Bunny Blast, Movies in the Park, and the Fourth of July Parade will incorporate an anniversary theme where family, friends, and fun come together. Sports enthusiasts can also sign up for a softball or golf tournament over the summer. On Saturday, September 17, our featured anniversary event will be a Family Carnival filled with entertainment, rides, and food! See page 3 for details.



El Niño What to do to Make it Through

The National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration is predicting heavy rainfall this winter and spring.

BE PREPARED

Plan Ahead!

- Prepare a disaster kit for yourselves and your pets.
- Have an evacuation and family communication plan with a designated meeting place.
- Keep documents, medicine, and valuables in your kit for quick access.
- Have sandbags ready for use.
- Remove debris from rain gutters, downspouts, and roof drains around your property.
- Sign up for AlertOC at alertoc.com to receive timely emergency notifications.
- Consider flood insurance since most homeowner's insurance do not cover flooding. Visit floodsmart.gov for more information.

BE AWARE

During a Flood

- Do not walk through floodwaters. Six inches of moving water can sweep you off your feet.
- Do not drive into a flooded area. Most cars can be carried away by less than two feet of water.
- Stay away from river beds, flood control channels, and basins.
- Avoid downed power lines and electrical wires.
- Stay informed of weather predictions and road closures.

BE READY

Evacuation

- Grab your disaster kit.
- If time permits, unplug appliances, turn off lights, and lock windows and doors.

ENVIRONMENT AND HOUSING

Don't Pollute the Gutter!

You may be wondering if "polluting the gutter" is a contradictory phrase. Actually, it's not! With the upcoming rains, it is even more important that we are careful about what goes down the gutter. Pollutants that end up in the gutter can enter the storm drain system and will eventually discharge into our local creeks, lakes, and the ocean without any treatment. Some of the most common pollutants are generated from everyday urban activities and include litter, oil, dirt, food, pet waste, debris, paint, and cleaning products. These pollutants can have harmful effects on water and wildlife resources, recreational use, and human health risks that lead to beach closures.

Some of the common causes of pollution may not be noticeable, particularly pollutants that come from trash carts. If your trash carts are dirty, never wash wastewater into the gutter because it carries bacteria and pollutants into the storm drain system and local watersheds that may pose human health risks.

Here's how you can make a difference:

- Wash trash carts on the lawn or use a local cleaning service.
- Get rid of pollutants in urban runoff by never washing anything into the street or gutter. Pick up pet waste and dispose of it in the trash. Use household cleaners, chemicals, pesticides and fertilizers only as needed and according to the label. Dispose of oil properly and use drip pans.
- Remind contractors that nothing may be discharged into the street, gutter or storm drain system. It is illegal and harmful to our environmental resources.
